



A Harrison College alum and Civil Engineering graduate of UWI and Louisiana Tech University, Philip had a 40-year career at the Barbados Ministry of Transport, Works, and Water Resources. He had not long been appointed Acting Chief Technical Officer when he fell ill.

In a statement on behalf of the Prime Minister and fellow members of the Cabinet, Acting Prime Minister, the Honourable Santia Bradshaw, noted that "Philip's footprint has been indelibly stamped on the landscape of Barbados" through his work on public infrastructure including drainage systems, bridges, landslide mitigation and road rehabilitation. His legacy also includes such projects as the Mango Bay and Island Inn hotels.

He was a member of the Barbados Association of Professional Engineers, a Fellow of the International Road Federation, the Engineers Registration Board of Barbados, and the Soil Conservation Board.

The Acting Prime Minister, in extending condolences to his wife Dr. Leasandra Tudor and their son Alair, noted that Philip served his country with distinction and his guidance will be deeply missed as the many projects he had begun, progress to completion.

Matthew Clarke, a graduate of QC and an Assistant Professor at the University of Illinois in Champaign, Illinois, has been named as one of Forbes Magazine's 30 Under 30 in Science. This is the definitive list of the young people who are changing the world.

Matthew's research focuses on developments for the future of aircraft. While doing his doctoral work at Stanford, he developed an aircraft design tool, SUAVE: an open-source environment enabling multi-fidelity vehicle optimization, used by over 10,000 aerospace engineering professionals, including NASA and Airbus. He is now exploring the interaction between aircraft and the environment to make more sustainable designs and developing the next-generation design code, RCAIDE.

Joscelyn Gardner

Joscelyn Gardner, a Barbados Island Scholar from Queen's College, is an independent artist and a Professor of Fine Art at Fanshawe College in London, Ontario, Canada. She works across media in film, video, sound, printmaking, and text. She has had solo exhibitions across the Caribbean, USA, Canada, and Spain. Her awards include the Grand Prize at the 7th International Contemporary Printmaking Biennial in Quebec.

In an interview recently given to Black Maple, an online magazine featuring Black Canadian arts, history, and culture, she thanked her teachers at Queen's College, who inspired her greatly including Daphne St.. John, Dame Elsie Payne, Father Alfonso, and Jeanette Ottley. "They were incredibly supportive and made my school days exceptionally rewarding."

She currently has in development, an experimental 16mm film that began to evolve when she met and talked to a man who lives in a shack that he built from beach debris at Sam Lord's Castle in Barbados. The film explores his daily life in his shack relative to the geography and ecosystem of which he is a part. "He is an artist at heart and lives from the earth and the sea. I have been using the vegetation around him to physically develop and alter the 16mm film."

Mental Wellness Resources for Everyone

The holiday season can be extremely stressful for many people, for many reasons. Financial stress, relationship issues, general struggles in many area... all of these and more! Thankfully there are several resources available to help people cope.

Clinical psychologist Dr. Catherine Trotman offers the following information on this topic, in a recent presentation to the Rotary Club.

Mental Health is the overall state of your mind, Positive mental health is a state of well-being in which individuals can cope with life's challenges, work productively, and contribute to their communities.

Mental Illness is medical condition that disrupts a person's thoughts, emotions, and behavior, leading to impaired functioning, e.g. schizophrenia, & OCD (Obsessive Compulsive Disorder.)

Dr. Trotman strongly recommends that everyone engage in some form of self-care activities and lists the following: physical activity; healthy eating; adequate sleep; avoid procrastination; engaging hobbies: reading; music; creative expression; social connection; limit screen time & digital detox; mindfulness and meditation; journaling; nature and fresh air ; seek joy; set boundaries; practising gratitude; seeking professional help.

What Does Professional Help Look Like?

Psychiatry

- A medical doctor specializing in mental health
- Diagnoses and treats mental health disorder with medication

Clinical Psychology

 Diagnoses and treats mental health disorders with talking psychotherapy

Counselling Psychology

• Focuses on normative developmental mental health issues, as well as systemic challenges

When Do I Seek Professional Help?

Persistent Symptoms: e.g. intense sadness, anxiety, anger, hopelessness, or irritability that last for several weeks or longer.

Impaired Functioning: When mental health affects daily life, work, relationships, or academic performance, e.g. struggling to concentrate, sleep, or maintain relationships due

Thoughts of Self-Harm or Suicide: Active or passive thoughts of self-harm or suicide, or feeling that life is not worth living



Substance Abuse: Using drugs, alcohol, or other substances as a way to cope with emotional pain or stress

Changes in Eating or Sleeping Patterns: Significant changes in appetite, eating habits, or sleep patterns can indicate an underlying mental health issue and warrant professional attention.

Sudden Mood Swings: Extreme mood swings, intense episodes of anger or panic, or feeling out of control.

Isolation and Withdrawal: Withdrawing from social activities, isolating yourself, or avoiding situations you used to enjoy.

Persistent Physical Symptoms: Chronic headaches, stomachaches, unexplained pain, or other physical symptoms without a medical explanation

Trauma or Significant Life Changes: Experiencing traumatic events or major life changes (divorce, loss of a loved one).

Lack of Joy or Interest: Changes in the ability to experience pleasure or interest in activities you once enjoyed

Relationship Issues: If your relationships are consistently strained or causing distress

Unmanageable Stress: Stress that is overwhelming and affecting your ability to cope

Where Do I Seek Help?
