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# HCQCAA's 2024 WALK/RUN/BIKE ANNUAL FUNDRAISER A SUCCESS

HCQCAA, USA concluded its third annual fundraising challenge on Sunday, November 9, 2024. The challenge, which raised some BDS\$14,000 and another BDS\$12,000 specifically for scholarships, was fun, suspense-filled, and closely contested to the very end.

Twice daily updates sustained the event's momentum, and updates every two hours on the final day brought the event to a crescendo.

HC started off with an impressive lead, which it maintained for all seven days of the challenge, which is based on miles walked, run, or biked - or any combination thereof - accomplished in a single day and reported by 11:59 p.m. on the final day. But at 9 p.m. on Day 7, QC grabbed the lead and never let go!!!

Six prizes were up for grabs, four of which were possible thanks to the generous donation of four gift certificates by HC-alum-run **AQUA MEDICAL**.

The runner-up was Neal B, also a friend of HCNJ who achieved 20.3 miles biked.

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## **HQCAA 2024 Virtual Walk/Run/Bike**

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Individual winner by school: Queen's College: Mary Symmonds who registered 13.9 miles walked and biked, despite recovering from a knee injury.

**Individual Team winner:** In the major upset of the challenge, **HC Team HCNJ**, captained by **Trevor Atherley**, won with a record 86 miles and clinched the individual team category victory this year.

They impressively sidelined last year's winner MS QC Warriors, captained by Mary Symmonds, which took second place with 73.16 miles.

In another upset, **Team EL Friends for QC** captained by Eleanor Larrier took 3rd place with 43.66 miles pushing out last year's third place team, **MS QC Warriors Team 2.** 

School winner: **Queen's College** captured this for the third consecutive year.

In a closely contested challenge drawing participants from across the US and the world, QC ended up once again in first place with a triumphant final combined team score of 240.9 miles, bettering their 2023 score of 152.57 miles. HC's final score was 162.43 miles, also improving on their 2023 accomplishment of 122.67 miles.

The race outcome was truly an example of teamwork is dream work. Every mile counted.



The death is announced of Mrs. Mary Gibbs, former teacher, Head of Department (Foreign Languages) and Deputy Principal of Harrison College.


Mrs. Gibbs began her teaching career at Harrison College circa 1980 and retired on her 60th birthday on April 23, 2002.



## **Childhood Christmas Memories**

Now is the time of year for me to summon up wonderful child-hood memories of Christmas. Not cold winds, snowflakes, and roaring fires but balmy trade winds, clear star-filled nights, and Father Christmas uncomfortably warm in that heavy suit. Thankfully, it was not until I was well grown that he changed into the red shorts, flowered shirt, and flip-flops!

In the garden, the Poinsettia is doing very nicely this year. The streetlight has not upset its internal clock and it has had the right amount of light and dark needed for it to turn that scarlet Christmas red. Next to it, the Snow on the Mountain is in bloom and will be a mass of white by Christmas Day.

Since November, the most important question of all has been asked time and again, "When will de boat arrive?" My oldest Christmas memory revolves around that question!

Sometimes because of bad weather somewhere along the Christmas trees' journey, the ship would be late, and everyone worrying — "will it get here in time?" I think it always did, though I remember, once or twice, a mad Christmas Eve rush to get the tree home and decorated.

By early December it's definitely Christmas season at our house. Daddy worked at K R Hunte and every evening, until well after bedtime, he would sit on the floor of our verandah surrounded by scooters, bicycles, tricycles, and lots of other toys he was assembling for sale in the store. You know that living on the island everything arrived Ikea style, in bits and pieces. My brother and I were allowed to watch and perhaps hand something that was out of reach while silently wishing for one of each to be under our tree!

Then there was the shopping list which was filled with grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends. It seemed to take Mummy, with my brother and me in the backseat of the Baby Austin A30 and later the Morris Minor Traveler, days to drive round to all the houses delivering gaily wrapped packages, and collecting

just as many in return. Chocolates, hankies, Dinky cars, games, clothes, and always lots of books.

As little 'uns the most important pre-Christmas event was the Toy Service. Thoroughly cleaned up and decked out in our best, we showed up, each with a carefully selected, gently loved toy, that was presented at the altar to be delivered to a little 'un who was less fortunate that we were.

By the time we were 'tweens, Christmas Eve attendance at the midnight service at St Cyprian's in Belleville was the ritual as no one wished to delay Christmas morning one minute more than absolutely necessary.

The church was at the bottom of 7th Avenue and we were at the top. In between and all around, lived our friends so there was a lively walk there with Mummy, while Daddy went off in the car to fetch Great-Aunt Ivy who always joined us for the service. Afterwards, at about 1:00AM or so, Daddy dropped her back home and, if we had been very good through the service, Mummy supervised the opening of one present each before bed. We then all had about 4 hours sleep before we raced downstairs to get at the other packages under the tree.

Under the tree each year, one never to be forgotten gift was from Great-Aunt Violet and Great-Uncle John. It was a black box with an elegant red tassel that you lifted to reveal not one, or two, but 3 layers of the most wonderful chocolates in the world — Cadbury Black Magic all the way from England. You could smell them even before the gift was unwrapped, which we often did as soon as it arrived at the house, just to make sure! It was always the final gift opened and was rationed over the holidays as intently as water on a life raft!

Two indelible results of these Christmases which have formed all following Christmases for me, have been making sure that as many little 'uns as I can manage have a gift and I have Cadbury Black Magic chocolates on that glorious morning.

## **HCQCAN Improvement Campaign Update**

Our quest is to contribute to the schools' goal of maintaining academic excellence. Through our support, HCQCAN aims to contribute to capital projects NOW that will inspire students to develop critical skills which STEAM helps build and create students that can excel in the 21st century.

HCQCAN started the year with the realization that projects delayed is achievement denied. We recognized that we need to accelerate attaining our fundraising target of BDS\$2 million in the shortest possible time.

We established a fundraising advisory group with distinguished alumni, Sir Trevor Hassell, Sir George Alleyne, and Mrs. Anne Gittens to help us see how this can be achieved.

Our focus this year has been outreach, engagement and institutional consolidation. Tisha Peters of Career Coach is voluntarily helping us sustain outreach by creating and disseminating messages on social media. Marianne Greenidge and Naila Robinson have also been disseminating our posts to the QC and HC communities through various media respectively. We are also being assisted by an HC alumnus' company, Vault, to develop an outreach campaign. **Aqua Spa**, owned by an HC alumnus, is also

giving a 15 % discount to alumni of both schools if you drop us a line, so send us an email **2020hcqcgatherin@gmail.com** if you are interested.

On the organization consolidation side, HCQCAN has been registered as a charity in Barbados, and like the slow and sure tortoise, is on the cusp of having its bank account open. We are grateful to OHS for having been our banker from the inception.

We have also made great progress with sales of the Commemorative Publication and are almost sold out of the first print of this fundraising collector's item.

We will end this year with our fourth annual fundraising concert made possible with the usual generous contributions of talent from alumni, students and friends of the schools. Planning is underway, and our goal is to raise \$120,000 so that we can advance with the improvement campaign projects.

In 2025 — the year of return — we aim to gather as many year groups as possible. We are also looking at convening another Education Conference, so let us know if you wish to contribute to planning any of this. We also aim to conclude our fundraising so that the projects can be realized. We can do this with your help. Remember our mantra. It takes a contribution of \$250 each from 4000 alumni. Together we can do this.


The award categories we have used in the past are:

# 2024: A College Bell Retrospective



In 2024, Harrison and Queen's colleges had bumper years, with major achievements coming from students and alumni alike. And the College Bell has kept track of it all! Here's a look back at some of the major stories carried in this newsletter for our schools.

In 2024's first issue, we highlighted the official opening of the sports pavilion at Queen's College — an achievement 30 years in the making. At the forefront of this extraordinary journey were three remarkable trustees of the QC Give Back charity: Professor Anne St. John, Angela Simpson, and Vivian-Anne Gittens. Among the distinguished guests at the opening was international celebrity Sir Cliff Richard, a beacon of support whose contributions to the fundraising efforts were monumental. Also at the opening were members of the Board of Management; PTA; members of Parliament and officials from the Ministry of Education.

A strong contingent of past students who received Independence Honours in the ceremony in 2023 were also featured, along with the profiles of Juliet Daniel and Alan Emtage — two former students who were recognized by the Senate of Canada as Black Canadian Innovators.

The second issue headlined the historic Gun Hill Signal Station in St. George, Barbados, that was lit up and rocking on Friday, July 19 when the Give Back QC Charity hosted their ever-popular Crop Over Gun Hill by Moonlight.

This fund-raising event aimed to help purchase equipment for the newly opened Sports Pavilion. The event was well attended and is one of many highlighted activities and fundraising efforts that continued throughout the year to support projects at both schools. Both schools continued the tradition of excellence in sport. In 2024, both HC and QC were champions of the National Sports Council Under-16 Volleyball League. The QC cricket team was the first school team to win the Barbados Cricket Association's T20 Plate Competition for Second Division teams, defeating North Stars by six wickets in the final of the tournament. QC's fast bowler Raedon Bellamy was Player-of- the-Match after taking four wickets which assisted the team's victory. Alumni Matthew Wright, Sada Williams and Jack Kirby competed in the Summer Olympics in Paris.

In September as the new school year began, there were a number of scholarships and exhibitions awarded to both schools; some from the Ministry of Education in Barbados and other from the HCQCAA Toronto chapter. All the recipients were profiled in the third edition of College Bell.

In 2024, we lost some distinguished alumni across the world. Among them were Dr. Victor Blanchette, who had a long, distinguished career in Toronto, Canada; George Nicholson, rugby player/coach/administrator extraordinaire; Neville Rowe, entrepreneur; and Ricardo 'Ricky' Aimey, musician...all of Harrison College. On the QC side, losses included Monica Procope, former teacher; and Reverend Doctor Joycelyn Patricia Thorington-Alleyne, former Government Senator and General Manager at Purity Bakeries. We continue to extend our deepest sympathy to their families, and to all those connected to Harrison and Queen's Colleges who have lost loved ones in 2024.
